Anthropology of Global Health at the University of Vermont

Students interested in human health and its variation within and across different populations, cultures, and societies will want to consider tailoring their major or minor in Anthropology to focus on global health. The Anthropology Department offers a variety of courses centered on biological and cultural anthropology and related to the body and health in varying cultural, social, and environmental settings. These courses are designed for students with an interest in biological anthropology, medical anthropology, diversity and health, and public and global health.

We offer three different courses of study in this area, ranging from the most in-depth Anthropology Major with a Global Health Focus, to two options requiring fewer courses in related topics, including a Major Concentration in the Anthropology of Global Health, and an Anthropology Minor with a Global Health Focus. Students who complete the most in-depth Anthropology Major with a Global Health Focus option may also design their plan of study to complete the Major Concentration in the Anthropology of Global Health along the way.

Global Health Focus in the Anthropology Major

For students who wish to go into the most depth in the anthropology of global health, we offer a Global Health Focus in the Anthropology Major. To complete the Global Health Focus in the Anthropology Major, students take three core courses in cultural, biological and medical anthropology and four elective courses in the anthropology of health, together with four additional required courses needed to complete the Anthropology Major, as specified below:

All three of these core courses in cultural, biological, and medical anthropology (9 credits):

Four elective courses related to approaches to health in biological anthropology and cultural anthropology (12 credits), including the following:

At least two of the following 100-level courses (6 credits):

Two additional required core courses (6 credits):

One additional elective course at the 100- or 200-level (3 credits):

These may include any of the 100- or 200-level courses above not already used to fulfill major requirements and/or other 100- or 200-level courses in Anthropology designated as counting toward the major in the standard major guidelines for Anthropology. If your other 100-level are not drawn from at least two different subfields (e.g., biological and cultural anthropology), you will need to ensure that this course is from a separate subfield.

One additional course at any level (3 credits)

This may include any of the courses above not already used to fulfill major requirements and/or other course in Anthropology designated as counting toward the major in the standard major guidelines for Anthropology. Course of particular interest include but are not limited to:

Additional recommendations:

Beyond the coursework described above, it is also highly recommended that majors take the **proseminars ANTH 105 and/or ANTH 205** and seek one or more relevant **capstone experiences**, such as an internship, practicum, or research experience involving the application of biological/medical anthropology.

We also encourage students to do the following:

- participate in foreign language training beyond the introductory level to enhance their cultural awareness and communication skills.
- pursue training in statistics such as STAT 051 or higher to develop quantitative social science skills.

Additional notes on the major: Students interested in completing the Major in Anthropology with Global Health Focus are encouraged to consult their faculty advisor early in their program. Students with the focus will fulfill all requirements of the Anthropology major but choose the courses that they take to mostly focus on health-related topics.

Signup Instructions: Go to the Registrar's webpage and sign up for an Anthropology Major or an Anthropology Major with a Concentration in the Anthropology of Global Health, the latter of which will ensure that the words Anthropology of Global Health are indicated on your official academic transcript. In addition, fill out the Anthropology Major with a Global Health Focus form and turn in to Williams Hall 509 so that you are connected with related advising resources.

For Anthropology majors who wish for a moderate level of engagement in the anthropology of global health, we now offer a new Major Concentration in the Anthropology of Global Health, as of Spring 2017. Students who complete the more involved Anthropology Major with a Global Health Focus (above) may also design their plan of study to complete the Major Concentration in the Anthropology of Global Health along the way. The official Concentration allows for Anthropology of Global Health to appear on students' official academic transcripts. Anthropology majors not wishing to devote more than twelve credits to the study of global health may elect to complete the Concentration only without pursuing the more in-depth Focus. Electing the Concentration only gives students some exposure to key courses in the anthropology of global health while allowing them added flexibility in their other major courses.
